Mass tort cases must be filed within a specific time frame, known as the statute of **limitations**. These vary by state but generally range from **2 to 4 years** after:

- The date of injury If your symptoms appeared immediately.
- The date you discovered the harm If injuries surfaced later.
- The date the product was recalled If legal action started after public warnings.
